## Do Pedestrians Have the Right-of-Way in Pennsylvania?



...It's complicated, but, YES, drivers must yield when a pedestrian is in a crosswalk at an unsignalized intersection, when the person is proceeding with a pedestrian "walk" signal or green light, or when a person is crossing at a marked mid-block crosswalk or marked trail crossing. The pedestrian must give the driver enough time to yield and not step out suddenly!

CAT examines relevant pedestrian laws in PA Vehicle Code, Title 75.

<u>Right-of-Way of Pedestrians in Crosswalks</u> - Pedestrians have the right-of-way in marked or unmarked crosswalks at intersections and marked crosswalks at mid-block locations/trail crossings. The pedestrian must be "IN" the crosswalk, i.e. at least one foot off the curb with intent to cross the street.

§ 3542(a) ...the driver of a vehicle shall yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk or within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection.

**Exercise of Care by Pedestrian** - Pedestrians must give motorists and bicyclists enough time/distance to yield without needing to make an emergency maneuver.

§ 3542(b) No pedestrian shall suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close as to constitute a hazard.

<u>Crossing at Signalized Intersections</u> - At signalized intersections, pedestrians should cross only with a pedestrian "Walk" signal, or in its absence, in a parallel direction to a green light; in both cases having the right-of-way over turning vehicles.

§ 3112(a) & 3113(a) ...pedestrians facing any green signal... "Walk" or walking person signal... may proceed across the roadway within a crosswalk. (CAT Note: *Use of the phrase "may proceed" in these sections should not be used to infer that a pedestrian should cross on a "Don't Walk" or red signal. See also local ordinances, i.e. City of Bethlehem Ord. 1769 §11 changes "may" to "shall... only")* 

<u>Pedestrians Crossing Not at Crosswalks</u> - Pedestrians may cross between intersections without a mid-block crosswalk, but they do not have the right-of-way. Pedestrians shall not cross between adjacent signalized intersections in urban districts.

- § 3543(a) -Every pedestrian crossing a roadway at any point other than within a crosswalk at an intersection or any marked crosswalk shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles upon the roadway.
- § 3543(c) says that the only time crossing between intersections is completely prohibited is in urban districts between adjacent intersections that are signalized.
- § 3543(d) says that pedestrians may not cross intersections diagonally unless specifically authorized.

## **Driveways and Alleys are Treated as Crosswalks**

§ 3547. The driver of a vehicle emerging from or entering an ...driveway shall yield the right-of-way to any pedestrian approaching on any sidewalk extending across the ...driveway.
